Treasury Updates Guidance to Increase Supply of Affordable Housing

In a <u>press release</u> last week, the U.S. Department of the Treasury (<u>Treasury</u>) announced that it has issued updated guidance to increase the ability of state, local, and tribal governments to use Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (<u>SLFRF</u>) in order to boost the supply of affordable housing in their communities and help lower housing costs.

On January 27, 2022, Treasury issued a <u>final rule</u> for SLFRF that provided broad flexibility for the use of funds, including for affordable housing. The updated guidance, which can be found in <u>Final Rule FAQs 2.14 and 4.9</u>, takes two additional steps:

- Increases flexibility to use SLFRF to fully finance long-term affordable housing loans
- Expands presumptively eligible affordable housing uses to further maximize the availability of SLFRF funds for affordable housing

According to the announcement, these steps follow a commitment in the Administration's recently released Housing Supply Action Plan to leverage American Rescue Plan funds for investments in affordable housing. Additionally, the press release announces that Treasury and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) have developed an "Affordable Housing How-To Guide," which provides a summary of updated guidance related to SLFRF recipients' ability to use SLFRF funds to invest in affordable housing. The "how-to" guide provides examples of how recipients can combine and "layer" SLFRF with other sources of funding to maximize resources and meet housing needs.

HUD Publishes 2022 CoC Program NOFA

In a <u>press release</u> yesterday, and also <u>here</u>, on <u>Grants.gov</u>, HUD announced that it has published the notice of funding availability (<u>NOFA</u>) for fiscal year (FY) 2022 Continuum of Care (CoC) program competition. The NOFA makes available \$2.794 billion in funding for FY 2022 grants, including approximately \$80 million for noncompetitive Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) renewal and replacement expiring grants and at least \$52 million for new rapid re-housing, supportive services, and other activities critical to assist survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Applications must be completed and submitted in <u>e-snaps</u> by **September 30, 2022.** You'll find more information on <u>this page</u> at HUD's <u>Funding Opportunities</u> website.
