## **HUD Announces Section 3 Final Rule Office Hours**

This week on the <a href="HUD Exchange News webpage">HUD Exchange News webpage</a>, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (<a href="HUD">HUD</a>) announced that it will be hosting Section 3 final rule office hours to help support HUD housing and community development (HCD) and public housing authority (PHA) financial assistance recipients. The 90-minute sessions will provide an opportunity for participants to ask questions about the Section 3 rule and receive assistance with implementing Section 3 into their policies and programs. These are not training sessions. Attendees must have general knowledge of the Section 3 rule and started implementation to participate. All sessions will cover the same content. As space is limited, participants are encouraged to register for only one session. Dates are as follows:

- Session 1: August 25, 2022, 2:00 3:30 p.m. Eastern time
- Session 2: September 7, 2022, 2:00 3:30 p.m. Eastern time
- Session 3: October 11, 2022, 3:00 4:30 p.m. Eastern time
- <u>Section 4</u>: November 3, 2022, 2:30 4:00 p.m. Eastern time
- Section 5: December 13, 2022, 2:30 4:00 p.m. Eastern time
- Section 6: January 11, 2023, 1:30 3:00 p.m. Eastern time

Section 3 requires that recipients of certain types of HUD financial assistance provide training, employment, contracting, and other economic opportunities to low and very low-income individuals—and to businesses that provide economic opportunities to such persons—to the greatest extent possible. The <u>final rule</u>, which was published on September 29, 2020, updated and streamlined Section 3 regulations and reporting requirements.
